The Cloud & Platforms-what's happening outside libraries

The Cloud encourages a process

of deconstruction. An ERP system doesn't solve all problems any more than the LMS/ILS does. The monolithic ERP is losing relevancy. The existence of disillusioned users is one of the core drivers in this change to what Garter characterises as the 'postmodern' ERP.

ORACLE is no longer a single product suite but sits in The Cloud alongside interoperable applications from ISVs. In summary, Gartner's analysis is that the result will be a more loosely coupled ERP environment with much of the functionality sourced as Cloud services or via business process outsourcers.

Digital scholarship

To advance the educational and research processes, libraries are developing digital scholarship centers, often in partnership with other campus units. These centers extend traditional methods of research by applying new technologies, such as GIS data, visualization, and big data across the curriculum. Digital asset management, digital preservation, training, consultations, and tools for digital scholarship are among the suite of services and resources provided.

Collection assessment trends

There has been a remarkable shift to the incorporation and integration of more continuous, ongoing, flexible, and sustainable review of collections rather than ad-hoc project-based models. "Rightsizing" the collection has become a norm

Evidence of learning: Student success, learning analytics, credentialing

Student success continues to be an important focus for higher education institutions, where the trend towards performance-based funding and accreditation criteria includes an emphasis on learning outcomes, retention, and matriculation.

Open Educational Resources (OER)

OER are experiencing a watershed in higher education in the United States, as articles in major news media drive public awareness of the high cost of college-level textbooks.

Open Access: How will a new library system help with this?



"Most research libraries in the world are still deeply grounded in the subscription system and have yet to recognize and adopt the goal of transformation to an open access publishing system."

Remove any barriers to subscription budgets being merged with publication funds; subscriptions and OA payments need to be consolidated under a single management: don't allow your system to support separation

Implement mechanisms to monitor (transparency!) and analyze costs of scholarly publishing (for instance, build on the example of the German APC initiative or others that document their OA payments, such as the Austrian Science Fund or the Wellcome Trust).


"At Utrecht University we strongly believe that **academic libraries** have lost their role in the discovery of scientific information and should focus on delivery instead".

"Without your own discovery tool you might feel stark naked.

However, we have to admit that **others can do a better job** on discovery, so don't spend too much time on this. **Make a priority of your delivery task** and rethink the way you can provide value for your users"

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So what does "Platform" mean?



A platform:


consummates matches among users and facilitates the exchange of goods, services or social currency--- enabling value creation for all participants

Create value using resources they don't own or control—so they can grow much faster

Platforms derive **value from the communities** they serve

Platforms invert companies—from a traditional inward focus to an outward focus

Platform attributes



The Core interaction:

the single most important activity that takes place- **the exchange of value** that attract most participants—involves three components....

Participants

- producer (creates value)
- consumer (consumes value).

These are *roles*. A person or organisation might be both




Who will be allowed to develop on your library services platform?

Kinds/degrees of openness regarding participation. How open is the platform in terms of *types* of developers?

Core (basic platform capabilities)

Extension (add features & enhance value –typically via APIs)

Data aggregators (harvest data about user & interactions and re-use/re-sell



Current library platforms are not very open

"There have been some modest steps to encourage third party developments. Both the OCLC WorldShare and ExLibris Alma platforms have established developer **networks** but they remain small and unattractive to third party developers, so have gained little traction."

By sharing their resources, the **libraries were able to engage Sustainable Collection Services** to analyze the circulating print monographs of each library individually and as a whole. The Project has both short-term and long-term goals. In the short-term, **libraries are able to make data-driven decisions about weeding their collections** and reclaim space for student use. As we look to the future, **the Project can also be the foundation for a shared collection mindset and allow greater cooperative collection development.**





It's not really about the technology......

The basic issues don't change -success factors for a 1990s project-

- Political support and enthusiasm by members of the consortium
- Flexible management in all authorities who were prepared to make sacrifices in the interest of the consortium's objectives, coupled with an openness that precluded any hidden agendas
- Tight project management
- Clear terms of reference for individual groups and clear ground rules
- Good communication systems
- Expert technical advice.

"a shift from bureaucracy to enterprise.."

"It requires a shift from bureaucracy to enterprise, an adaptive organization that reviews and reshapes what it does in light of changing requirements".

"in an environment of change while overall mission and values may remain the same, new and shifting goals become the norm.

As goals shift in a changing environment, so does the need to think about how to marshall the means to meet them. This may need reorganization, new staff skills, changing priorities, reallocation of staff and resources, and so on.
